Policy Statement: The following policy has been discussed with and agreed to by Geomatics Canada respecting the requirements for re-establishing lost monuments and establishing secondary intersecting monuments on common boundaries that define both provincial and federal lands: <ol style="list-style-type: none">1. An SLS can establish intersecting monuments on boundaries defining both federal and provincial lands.2. An SLS can perform straightforward re-establishments of lost monuments on common boundaries required prior to establishing the intersecting monuments.3. If an SLS discovers problems with the re-establishment (conflicting monuments, errors in measurement, etc.), Geomatics Canada shall be contacted for instructions on how to proceed with the re-establishment.4. In all cases a copy of the plan shall be submitted to Geomatics Canada's Edmonton office for review and comments prior to ISC approval of the plan. Geomatics Canada have assured ISC that their review of such plans will be given high priority as to not delay any projects.5. Geomatics Canada's Regina office shall be kept abreast of activities by providing them with a copy of covering letters.		
Purpose: This policy provides a practical approach for conducting surveys on boundaries defining different jurisdictions. It is primarily intended to cover situations dealing with Indian Reserve boundaries.
